

The Maryland Equitable Justice
Collaborative inaugural report, "Breaking the 71%:
A Path Toward Racial Equity in the Criminal Legal
System" (2025), examines the systemic factors
contributing to the overrepresentation of Black
Marylanders in the state's correctional facilities
and offers 18 concrete recommendations for
reform.

Commenting on the legislative success we have

had, Attorney General Brown remarked "These new laws represent a critical step forward in addressing the deep injustices caused by mass incarceration in Maryland. In just 18 months, we've made meaningful progress—offering relief to those who have been incarcerated far too long, particularly Black youth, and ensuring that individuals who are seriously ill or elderly have a chance to leave prison and live out their lives with dignity."
